

Guide to Liverpool Food & Drink



Alma de Cuba – offering a mix of Cuban, Hispanic and Latin American influences dishes in a renovated 200 year old Church, this restaurant and bar is something entirely different. Either for a delicious cocktail or meal, this is a great place to start the evening. At weekends, enjoy the performance by the Samba dancers!

Piazza at Metropolitan Cathedral – cathedrals may not always be associated with good food, but the Piazza does a great version of the local dish “Scouse”, a type of stew. Traditionally served with red cabbage, beetroot, and crusty bread, why not try this instead of fish and chips?



Panoramic – Britain’s tallest restaurant is located on the 34th floor of Liverpool’s West Tower and has 360° views over the city, the River Mersey and the Wirral Peninsula. This, coupled with fine cuisine and outstanding service makes it one of the most popular restaurant and bars in the North West.

Philharmonic Dining Rooms – one of Liverpool’s original “gin palaces”, the “Phil”, as it’s known locally is a traditional and opulent pub with a great atmosphere. Frequented by locals, students and visitors, it is a tourist attraction in its own right, with many popping in to look at the beautiful gentlemen’s toilets, which are decorated in marble, wood panelling and gold.



Restaurant Bar and Grill – originally an old banking hall, this modern and popular restaurant offers contemporary food with impeccable service. Particularly renowned locally for its cocktails, the bar area is a lively place to head for to relax and people watch.

Dr Duncans – offering a full range of Cains’ (the local brewery) beers, this is a popular pub overlooking St George’s Hall gardens. The pub is named after Dr Duncan, who, after arriving in Liverpool in the and seeing the spread of disease amongst the poor, is widely credited with introducing the UK’s first public health system.

London Carriage Works – located by the boutique Hope Street Hotel in the city’s Georgian Quarter, the London Carriage Works is run by chef patron Paul Askew, an award winning chef and proud ambassador for the city. Specialising in using local, fresh produce, the restaurant offers innovative menus and a large selection of wines.



Circo – for a night out with a difference, Circo, located in the Albert Dock, has a deluxe circus theme, complete with laughing clowns, circus-styled staff and other quirky circus memorabilia. The bar and restaurant often has entertainment and is a popular venue.

Leaf on Bold Street – what could be more traditional than a nice cup of tea? Well, Leaf offers hundreds of varieties of tea in a relaxing, trendy atmosphere. The knowledgeable staff can recommend the perfect tea for you, whether to be enjoyed on its own or as a meal accompaniment. The venue also has regular live music evenings and art on display.
